Life Without Money

What is money? Most of us would define it in terms of being a medium of exchange, giving one thing in return for something else. The exchange in this context would entail the possession of something that is considered to have value. We work, thus we are rendering a service. In exchange for that service, we then receive an item(s) that we think is valuable. We keep that item until the time comes when we exchange it for something that we want or need.
